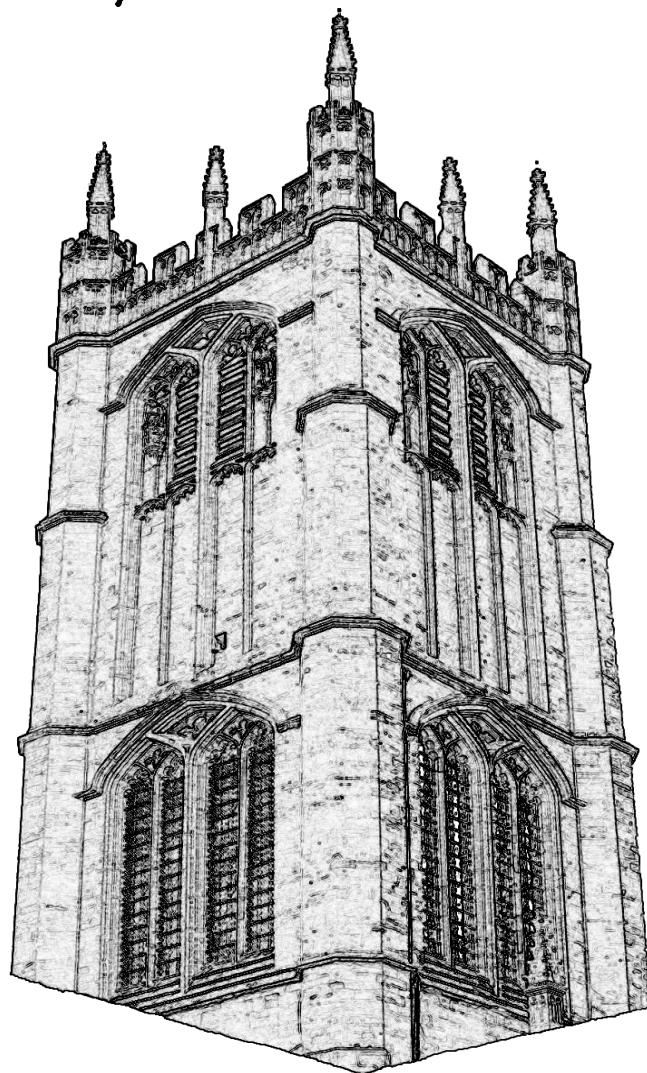

CLERGY LETTER

On September 1st I begin work as the new curate in the Ludlow Team Ministry. For me it is a step which marks the next stage in a journey which has seen several years of vocation testing and theological training, culminating in my ordination to the diaconate in July. Unusually for a new curate I will be a known face to at least some of you, having spent four months on placement in Ludlow, mostly in St Laurence's, in the autumn of 2007.

So, for those of you who are wondering who I am and where I have come from... I grew up in rural north Oxfordshire before moving to Christchurch, Dorset. In Christchurch my family were actively involved in the life of the Priory where I sang as a chorister, was an altar server and worked in the holidays as a relief verger. I trained for teaching at S. Martin's College Lancaster, during which time I was involved at Lancaster Priory and was secretary to the college chaplaincy. I started my teaching career in a village school on the Fylde, just outside Preston, where I was also involved in the life of the church. Eleven years ago I moved to teach at Wigmore, where I taught for four years before moving on to the school in Beguildy, near Knighton. Since moving to Herefordshire I have worshipped in Pembridge where I was also churchwarden. I have spent the past three years training for ordination on WEMTC, here in Ludlow. I live at present in Titley, near Kington, but am looking forward to moving to Ludlow, early in September.

Having spent all my life in education, either receiving it or giving it and sometimes both, it is going to be quite a shock not to be ruled by the school timetable. Such a change is, however, no bad thing. All of us need change from time to time, whether great or small, in order to be brought face to face with the realities of the world in which we live and our part in it as Christians witnessing to the love and power of God. We can't always get it all right (I'm sure I won't), but we can have a go and do our bit to encourage each other on the journey. As we journey together, let us pray for our witness to all we meet in these parishes and in our lives, wherever God may take us.

FROM THE BISHOP OF HEREFORD

The holidays are over and it is back to school and college for many. Perhaps you were able to go away, or may be you've had a holiday at home, or may be you still have a holiday to which to look forward. "The thing that I remember especially", someone said to me, "was sitting still for twenty minutes just watching a flock of birds in a tree."

On holiday, we give ourselves time (and permission?) to do things differently. When we are less busy, we can value the "being" more than the "doing", the "looking" more than the "activity", the enjoying and delight. So often what remains after a holiday is the memory of sitting still and other experiences of being, rather than what we've done or achieved.

Our word "holiday" does of course come from "holy day", when, in the past, people only stopped work on the holy days of the Church year. The meaning and derivation of the word "holiday" encourages us to give space, delight, and enjoyment to things beyond ourselves, to make the connection with our inner and spiritual needs. There is a proper blurring of sacred and secular. They are not separate realms! God our Creator has left his print on all that he has made. The book of Genesis tells us, "God saw everything that he had made, and behold it was very good." Holidays enable us to delight in that goodness of creation.

As I write this, we are in the midst of hosting the Three Choirs Festival in Hereford. So much of the music played during that week, like so much of the music heard on Radio 3 and Classic FM, is "sacred", written for use in worship. Whether heard in that context or not, music is able to take us closer into the presence of God.

Music, like the stillness and rest on holiday, enables us to be in touch with the deeper parts of our own being, which also include the pains, worries, hurts, cares and anxieties, as well as the delight and enjoyment. Like sacred music, these have their truest place in worship and prayer, where they can be brought to God and laid before him. Holiday blurs with holy day, secular blurs with sacred, and we are enriched to go into the new term, new school year, and all that lies ahead.

We are now looking forward to a Confirmation Service. We are very pleased that the Confirming Bishop is to be Bishop Alistair.

HOW ARE WE DOING?

St Laurence's is an expensive church to run. You may be interested in our financial position as at mid-2009.

First the good news. Our expense control has been pretty good so far this year, and we are very close to our budget. The exception is a planned but unbudgeted expense on a new guidebook for St Laurence's, which will generate significant income and profit in future years.

The bad news is that our income lines are lagging behind. Our visitor income is down, our pledged (envelope) giving is down, and the legacies of which we had been notified have not yet materialised. This is beginning to place a strain on our cash flow, and we are having to tightly control any expense until the income flow improves later in the year. In terms of hard numbers, our cash outflow was budgeted to be £ 9,000 at this stage of the year (returning to zero by year-end). The actual cash outflow is some £ 33,000, or £ 24,000 worse than plan.

What more can we do? Well, the fête in July was an excellent start, generating nearly £ 4,000 surplus. We also plan other fund-raising activities later in the year. But we also rely on members of our congregation to maintain their pledged level of giving, and on our visitors to make some contribution to the running costs of the church when they visit. We have other fund-raising plans for the autumn, and improvements to the shop are also targeted at increasing income.

***The month ahead** from Revd James Stewart- Joint Acting Team Rector*

We give a warm welcome back to **the choir** at the beginning of another choral year. They will be particularly busy this term preparing for a number of major commitments. First is the new Shropshire Three Choirs Festival Evensong; a service with the combined choirs of St Laurence's, St Chad's Shrewsbury and Oswestry Parish Church on September 19th at 5.30pm at Oswestry. Then follows the welcome service for the new Bishop of Ludlow here on October 4th and the Diocesan Choirs Festival on October 10th at the Cathedral. A new mass setting is the main feature of this year's Festival, originally commissioned by Shaun Ward in his previous parish, and written by Peter Dyke. We look forward to hearing and learning that here at St Laurence's.

The **Vision Project Team** and their consultants are busy analysing and preparing to publish the results of the public consultation and engagement over the last 12 months. As we wait for the public exhibition in October we hold the PCC and those responsible for this work in our prayers.

ST LAURENCE'S PASTORAL LINKS

We have all been involved in discussions about the Vision for the future and part of this vision must also be about the pastoral welfare of the church "family" and for those who have any contact with us. This is mainly the responsibility of the pastoral Committee which represents the church in various local community groups as well as overseeing the pastoral welfare of the church family, including the Link Scheme. Most people are aware of this scheme which provides a link for every member of our congregations or anyone connected with the church but we feel it needs further explanation and emphasis after the series of discussions we have been having.

How do we see our pastoral care in the future? I hope I speak for everyone when I say that we would like it to play a really important part in our church life. Alongside the wonderful demonstration of our beliefs shown in the building itself, in the services and in the other church activities there should be a quiet provision of loving care for everyone; there for those who are actually in need and for those who may one day feel glad that there is someone they can and should turn to, both for actual help or for sympathetic understanding.

We have fifteen people acting as Links at the moment, besides the clergy and lay readers who obviously give us support, and I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge a big debt of gratitude to them and to the people who have acted as Links in the past. We provide a Link for over 150 people but unfortunately do not have enough Links to cover everyone, for which I am sorry. Obviously we would very much like other people to join the scheme.

So the Links would like to think that they are there for anyone who has a problem; either long term such as becoming house-bound after illness or accident or with a sudden personal or family problem that needs a sympathetic person, with more time at her disposal than perhaps the clergy may have, to listen and talk over such matters in confidence. It is important that members of our church family should not feel cut off for any reason. The church must show that it cares for every one of all shades of opinion. Sometimes there is a one-off situation which suddenly occurs such as the sudden death of a loved one when it is not always easy to rely on neighbours or family. Even in less serious circumstances a Link can prove useful, fetching a prescription or washing the hair of someone with a broken arm! Very often it is just about saying hello, either in church or around the town, perhaps over a cup of coffee.

We are hoping to raise the profile of the Link people by putting a list of them on the board and possibly wearing a badge on some occasions so that each one of you will know or be able to find out who is your Link. If anyone would like to ask any questions about this scheme or about anything written above then we shall be delighted to have a word or I am sure any of the Links would also be willing. Please give us your support in this matter.

SUPPORT FOR TRAIDCRAFT

It was one of Traidcraft's long-term goals to get mainstream companies to do fair trade (through the Fairtrade Mark). The Fairtrade market has really increased, in the last five years. Sales of Fairtrade goods in the UK reached £700 million in 2008. This is a real success story and the latest company to come on board is Cadbury. The downside is that Traidcraft has conjured into existence powerful competitors. While this is perhaps not so smart for a little company like Traidcraft, at the same time its mission is to achieve a scale of trade from which millions more producers can benefit!

Having rightly encouraged people to buy fair trade in supermarkets in order to get big companies interested, the message now is that **Traidcraft needs support more than ever in order to keep abreast of the big guys so that fair trade can be developed further.**



Traidcraft ensures the concept and practice of fair trade is not diluted because it is a company that is willing to go the extra mile to give support and trade development opportunities to poor producers; to be innovative; to influence trade policies in the wider arena of trade justice. Commercial companies have other priorities.

SHOPPING IN ST LAURENCE'S

These past few weeks have seen a major refurbishment of the St Laurence Shop. New display space has been provided, new lighting put in place, the entrance has been opened up, the till is now properly positioned within the shop and the whole area has been re-carpeted. This physical refurbishment is a prelude to changes in the stock and the manner in which it is displayed. THE CONSERVATION TRUST'S 'RAISON D'ÊTRE'

It has come to the notice of the Trustees of late, that the reason for the existence of the Trust has become 'blurry' round the edges in the minds of many people. There are also many newcomers to the town and to the congregations of St Laurence's who are perhaps confused between the various groups and organizations that make up the management of this Greater Parish Church.

A History, very briefly, of the Conservation Trust. It was created from the amalgamation of two groups that variously saw to the conservation and preservation of the church—The Friends of St Laurence's; a secular organization that was in existence for more than 40 years and looked generally to the repair of the building, inside and out; and then, also, The Fabric Trust; this too was secular. **It was formed** around 13 years ago specifically to renew some pinnacles that were crumbling and needed replacement. It continued to attend to fabric needs of the external building. **So, until 2006**, these two organizations ran along side each other, eventually, again, starting to create confusion within people's minds especially whenever the Fabric Committee (Parochial Church Council general management and maintenance) was mentioned.

Seeing the problems this was creating, The Friends and The Fabric Trust decided to simplify matters and created The Conservation Trust for St Laurence, Ludlow and continued the tradition of both its predecessors by remaining totally secular. This encourages supporters whose interest is in the wonderful structure of this beautiful and important church.

The Trust's purpose being to fulfill its remit exactly as it says on the tin 'to conserve the church of St Laurence'. It can look to both external and internal requirements. For example, the Trust has recently repaired and replaced the hoppers, downpipes and considerable drainage works urgently in need of attention. The Trustees are guided by the Trust Deed as approved by the Charity Commissioners. It will continue to serve the church as best it can.
